# Final multiplier events and completion of the project:



In our sixth and final newsletter you will find information about:

Due to the pandemic, the project requested and received a four month extension, up to the end of December 2020:

The extension allowed more time to complete successfully all the project outputs, and plan and carry out the final multiplier events online in each of the participating countries.

Despite the original intention to carry out the multiplier events face to face, as suggested in the application, by July 2020, it became evident that this would not be possible due to constraints on physical meetings in each of the countries.

The project partners all agreed to turn the events into virtual events, with the approval of the European commission. This allowed more participants to take part in the multiplier events and from various parts of the world. This would have not been possible if the events were taking place face to face.

Austria: 12th November 2020

England: 26th November 2020

Denmark: 10th December 2020

## Multiplier events

The main aim of the multiplier events was to disseminate the project outputs. Each country designed the event with this aim in mind but each webinar took a different form.

Participants in each event had the opportunity to find out about *Inclusive Inquiry*, the project's approach and to listen first hand experiences from teachers who took part in the process. At the same time, through the project video participants were able to see and hear children who took part in the project talking about the impact that the approach had on them.

Finally, participants had the opportunity to ask questions and discuss the approach. During some events, participants also had the opportunity to network with other participants in smaller groups where technology facilities allowed this.

All events run smoothly and were very successful. All project outputs are now available for free download on the project website:https://reachingthehardtoreach.eu/




#### Retirements
